


CHECKING ENGINE COMPRESSION

Annual Maintenance can also include an engine compression test. This is giving your engine a mechanical checkup and will enable you to evaluate the condition of the piston rings, valves, and head gasket. You can do all of this without removing the head. Once the head is removed you will not be able to check the rings or valves. A compression check is easy to make. You need a compression gauge and it is handy to have a sparkplug adaptor. (Bratton's sells sparkplug adaptor for \$6.50 listed under distributor parts) The adaptor allows you to thread the gauge into the sparkplug hole and will give a more accurate reading than a tapered rubber fitting.

- Step 1. Remove all the sparkplugs and open the throttle wide open.
- Step 2. Thread the gauge into the sparkplug hole, hand tight is adequate.
- Step 3. Rotate or turn the engine over with the starter motor, 4 10 revolutions.

Step 4. Read the compression gauge. This reading will be expressed in PSI (pounds per square inch). Note these readings in a notebook or reference book you keep for this car. When you make the next compression test it is handy to see how your car is doing over time.



RAIDIATOR CRAP TRAP

Insert a short section of knee high nylon stocking into your upper radiator hose. Trim off the excess nylon hose after tightening the upper hose clamp. Refill radiator. The flow of cooling water through the engine and upper hose will force the nylon hose up into the upper radiator tank. Any rust particles in the cooling system will be trapped in the nylon hose. (See illustration left) Try it – it works!

<u>Tiny Tip:</u> If you're installing a new top on your A, take some pieces of blue masking tape and stick them all around the edge of the roof below the tack holes in your sheet metal. Mark the location of the holes on the tape before you lay your top material out. Then when you go to tacking the material down you'll have easy reference points for locating the tacking places. ~Ray Horton





HEAD GASKET REINFORCEMENT

A number of years ago I observed an old-time Model A guy installing a copper FelPro head gasket on a Model A engine. One of his techniques was to strip the insulation off a length of 14 gauge copper Romex wire and lay a nominal inch or so on top of the gasket in space between the #1 and #2, and #3 and #4 cylinders. He would attach it with some glue. He explained that this would crush down into the gasket and reinforce the thin area of the dash 3 and dash 4 gaskets. Has anyone had experience with this technique?

Re: Head Gasket Reinforcement

I cut a piece of "tag" wire that is .018" thick between the two head studs that are in that area. I use super glue to glue it to the block. Then I lower the head gasket on top. I only do this on copper head gaskets.



Re: Head Gaskets Reinforcement

Been doing the same for years on any head with more than 6.5 to 1 compression I use 0.020 wire and counter sink the stud holes in the head where the wire wraps. I have not found it necessary on stock heads or lower than 6 to 1 comp heads.




