


BEAVER CHAPTER PORTLAND, OREGON

"Change the Condenser"

On most any Model A tour one of the participating cars will likely drift to the side of the road inoperative. Soon after everyone gathers around someone in the crowd will surely yell out "change the condenser". This knee-jerk reaction has become ingrained in Model A folklore. The truth is that good quality condensers available today seldom ever fail.

Over the years I have seen countless numbers of condensers changed out, but I have only observed one that actually failed, and that was because the ground strap soldered onto the back of the condenser came loose due to an over-heated engine.

The common practice for checking a condenser is to use an ohm meter. It will tell you if it is shorted or open, but not what the actual capacitance value is.



A Honeytek A6013L Capacitor Tester (called a condenser in automotive jargon) is available through Amazon for about \$17. The tester will tell you not only if the condenser is good or bad, but the actual value in micro-farads.

What I have discovered with my new Honeytek tester is that the good quality condensers from Bratton's test out at a nominal .243 micro farads.

I have never seen any documentation that Henry ever recorded about how many farads (or portions thereof) are required of a condenser to properly operate a Model A Ford ignition system. It is difficult to describe what a farad is, especially when only a very small portion of one is used in a Model A condenser. A micro farad is but .000001 of one farad



The Honeytek tester is a unique thing to have along on a tour. You can easily test a condenser while it is still attached to a distributor installed in a Model A. Simply remove the car's fuse, and slip a business card between the points. The plus lead of the tester is clipped to the arm of the points; the negative lead is clipped to ground on the distributor.

There are still poor quality condensers being sold by some suppliers. They are easily identified by the ground strap being soldered to the end of the condenser. The good quality ones sold by Bratton's and a few other suppliers will show three little dots on the strap indicating they are stake welded on.


The tan dress has a lovely horizontal line from the shoulders to the left hipline. Again, the use of a row of buttons provides nice detail.

Jim's Tech Tip - Winter Tire Pressures

If you drive your Model A in the winter, and I hope you can, remember to check the tire pressure when the mercury drops. Cold temperatures make the air pressure in the tires go down. Low tire pressure makes steering harder, and lowers your gas mileage. You may notice a little bit of a vibration, due to flat sport on the tires, when you first start driving. These should go away as the tires roll and the rubber warms up. \sim Jim Cannon

Suddenly, out of the darkness, an irritated voice in the crowd loudly shouted, "Okay, who's got the remote control?"

My First Model A Ford ∼ David Adair

There are many firsts in life and we remember most of them. This story is about one of those firsts, my first car, a Model A. My dad was really the one who wanted me to have a Model A. He started looking for one when I was thirteen. I have learned the availability of Model A's in the fifties was excellent. But dad was really fussy and he just continued to look. In thinking back to my early teen years, I was not very aware of what was going on car wise.

In 1958 we lived in Klamath Falls and early in the year Mom

and Dad drove to Colorado. On the way through Nevada dad saw a really nice-looking Model A parked at a service station and he told mom "On the way back we will have to stop and look at that car". He did, the owner ran a garage and did mechanical work. He told all about the car, but the upshot of the conversation, he was not ready to sell.

In August of the same year mom was driving home. It was just by chance that she saw the very same car for sale. She waited patiently for dad to get home from work and told him about the car the minute he walked in the door. They went back and sure enough it was the same Model A they looked at in Sparks Nevada. Of course, he remembered dad and gave him the first choice to buy. The owner had decided to give the car to a daughter who lived in Alaska. They were towing the A and it was not towing well. The kingpins were loose, and he knew the car would not tow well on the Al-Can Highway. Klamath Falls was the first stop on the way from Sparks.

I had spent most of the summer working on a farm East of Klamath falls. Pay was room and board plus \$6.00 per day. I think that was the minimum wage in '58. Any way on August 29th dad called and asked me "How much money do you have?" I told him \$300 and he said, "That's enough". The only trouble was it was a check from the farmer and this was Friday and all the banks closed at 5:00pm. But we managed to have a friend of dad's cash my check. Now it was over to see the seller.

Coincidentally \$300 was the sales price. And \$300 was most of my summer savings. Oh well, I was fifteen and buying my very own car. This was much better than riding a bicycle. This was a sharp car for one being 27 years old. There was black and white Naugahyde seats (later I learned this was over brown check). The hood and upper body was painted black, the side below the belt rail was white, and fenders and splash aprons were also black, and the wheels were white. I thought it looked sharp and it was all mine, no conditions attached, or so I thought.

Mom drove our '56 Chev home and dad and I drove the A. I can remember this part like it was yesterday. One of the first things I said, "Lets put the top down" and dad said, "It doesn't go down, this is a Sport Coupe". I was crushed. After all, we had looked at a 1930 Cabriolet and the top went down. This car looked just like the Cabriolet. That was how I learned the major difference between a Sport Coupe and a Cabriolet. Then he said, "There is one more thing, you don't want to drive this car more than thirty-five miles an hour, you will tear it up". This, added to the fixed top was a cruel blow, almost more than I could bare.

There were more instructions such as. Always turn the gas off. Why? Well if you are parked for quite a while you might not have any gas left. Then there was the spark, this had to be up when the engine was started, then adjusted down. Over the sixty years later there has been more instructions and insights to Model A'ing.

Eleven years after I bought my first car, restoration became a consideration. I had taken care of my service obligation, finished college, married the love of my life and had a house with a garage. For me restoration was a tedious process and I had to do almost everything twice and some things three or more times to get it right. A few things were OK as is. But that was then, and I have also now corrected those.

At the time, August 1958, I did not have any appreciation for what I had purchased. I do not remember the owners name or very much history of the car. I am the third owner of a late '31. During the restoring process I discovered that our car was complete. I replaced the push button . . . Continues on next page ...

starter on the dash. Got rid of the solenoid and added a proper Model A starter motor with a foot switch. A tray package had to be added and there was the question of ignition switches, I had to buy a pop out switch. Plus, it required 5 new hub caps.

Now it is 2018 and we have logged over sixty thousand miles on both short and long trips. And during this time, we have made hundreds of Model A friends. In fact, once when our children were young, we had visited with some friends from church. On the way home one of the girls said, "They don't have a Model A in their garage". Knowing so many people with A's the kids thought everyone owned a Model A. To me, owning a Model is the way things are supposed to be. And today the Sport Coupe seems almost like family. I had no intentions of keeping the car this long. And I tell anyone who wants to listen that I will sell it in a minute if the price is right!




February Bowling Tour
